Sally McLaren 'ENGLISH LANDSCAPE: AN ARCHETYPAL PERSPECTIVE ON THE EX-BOARDER Monday 1st December 2025 7:30pm - 8:45pm via Zoom

WMIP is pleased to invite Sally McLaren to present her paper published by Routledge in 2025 in a new book, 'The Un-Making of Them: Clinical Reflections on Boarding School Syndrome'.

Editor Nick Duffell introduces her chapter as 'a fascinatingly detailed case study of Jungian psychoanalysis with one ex-boarder patient.' Not an ex-boarder herself, McLaren allows her patient to get under her skin; over time, she creatively allows the deep-seated issues to emerge and reveal themselves. The therapy appears haunted by the shadowy presence of a fox. This wily, secretive survivor is featured in many English myths and legends, rooted in landscape; here he becomes a totem animal for the ex-boarder 'strategic survival personality'. After much hunting for her patient's fox, McLaren finds her way, inspired by Donald Kalsched: 'In trauma work ... we must learn to speak a soulful language, because it is uniquely the human soul that is threatened with annihilation by early trauma in a child's life.'

Sally adds, 'My paper is largely a demonstration of my analytic attitude and of the crucial role this plays in bringing to light the deeply hidden issues as they begin to emerge within the analytic relationship'.

WMIP Analytic Film Group - October 2025

Members of the West Midlands Institute of Psychotherapy came together to form an analytic film group which launched in February 2022. This arose from an interest expressed within the membership in the links between analytic thinking and film as a powerful tool through which human psyche is explored.

We were inspired by the writings of Gabbard, Hauke, Sabaddini and others and by the lively community of analysts and theorists around the world turning to this art form to further understanding of psyche, and looking to analytic thinking to inform understanding of film. We were given tips and encouragement from colleagues at the Northern Ireland Institute of Human Relations and The British Psychoanalytic Film Society where there exist well established film groups.

As Gabbard wrote ...'audiences do not attend films merely to be entertained. They line up at their local multiplex to encounter long forgotten but still powerful anxieties that stem from universal developmental experiences. They seek solutions to problems in the culture that defy simple answers or facile explanation. The screen in the darkened theatre serves as a container for the projections of their most private and often unconscious terrors and longings. As with all art forms, when we study film, we study ourselves."

We come together as a group with some shared language of psychotherapy and diverse interests in film. We have explored films spanning a range from Good Will Hunting to the Substance, via Wings of Desire and Interstellar to name a few.

Anyone who is a member of WMIP is invited to join us for the group. You may come once, occasionally or regularly; all comers are welcome.

The group meets online bi-monthly to discuss a film that we have watched separately, beforehand. We come to the session with our thoughts and responses but I think it is fair to say that through the discussion, even those films that have proved challenging to some have been rich source material for discussion. It is frequently said that the discussion has caused change in perspective. Sometimes we find our differences within the group as aspects of our psyches are in some ways revealed through the films we choose and responses we have. We respect these differences as they make us richer and we regard each choice as an offering, making space for differing perspectives and the group response.

The format of the session is that following a brief presentation about the film made by the proposer we begin a discussion, sometimes splitting into small groups for the first hour, depending on the numbers attending. People have their associations, sometimes strong feelings, questions, observations, reflections and these are shared in the group, building what might be described as an 'analytic review' of that film from this group in this moment.

Anyone attending the group can suggest a film and the title will be added to the pot which is drawn at the end of each session selecting the title for next. The person who has suggested the film is invited to present some initial thoughts about the film, perhaps with questions for the group to think about or their analytic perspective on what we've watched.

· Is it accessible on streaming platforms that are widely available?

We usually look at those available for free on BBC and Channel 4 as well as Netflix, Amazon Prime, BFI, Apple, Sky, You Tube etc.

· How much does it cost?

We try to find films that can be rented and not bought outright which usually costs extra

· How long is it?

Over recent years the average length of films has extended and so it is now not unusual to find films of 2.5-3hr. We try to keep to films within the 2(ish) hour time frame to make viewing possible with everyone's busy timetables. Equally very short films may not provide enough material for discussion for 1.5hours.

Quote from the group:

"I came to the WMIP film group as someone not particularly into films, and certainly not anything like a film nerd. But I have been encouraged to watch a number of fascinating films I would never have seen otherwise, and in ordinary human responses I have been able to share, I have been met warmly and been made welcome."

In addition to the bi-monthly meetings, we have organised in-person events that were also open to the public. On two occasions we worked with Flatpack Cinema presenting films at their annual festival. On one occasion we were lucky enough to work with Andrea Sabbadini who hosted a discussion after a viewing of Mediterranean Fever where he invited members of the audience to give their reflections on the film. Members of the film group committee also hosted a further public event with a discussion following a screening which took an analytic perspective on the Pressburger and Powell film The Small Back Room.

A workshop on whiteness: exploring racism in therapeutic work with speaker Helen Morgan Saturday 1st November 2025 in person only

This workshop is rooted in the assumption that the division of the races was created by a racist system for economic and political purposes. It is a deep, entrenched, social structure which creates and promotes white advantage. It is one within which we all live and is a dynamic which will inevitably permeate our therapeutic work. I suggest the position of colour blindness - which is frequently that taken by white therapists - resists acknowledgement of this reality and avoids the work required of us. I argue this is no altruistic endeavour but that, whilst clearly doing untold harm to people of colour, such a system also limits and distorts the development of white individuals and the society in which we are citizens. The day will include a presentation and small group work

Acorn into Oak Tree: Gender transition and individuation with speaker Adina Davidson Saturday 17th January 2026 via Zoom only

This paper will discuss Dr. Davidson's experience that gender transition, in all its many forms, functions as an agent of individuation. In addition, the paper explores the contrast between our cultural attitudes of widespread acceptance of many kinds of medical transformation of our bodies and the shadow projection that seems to often be constellated by medical changes to bodies that impact gender. We will look at an appropriate analytic attitude toward analysands who are exploring gender. Finally, the paper will lay out the possibility that Jung's thesis -beginning with the Red Book - that we all have all the archetypes offers a uniquely Jungian lens into gender expansiveness.

Judith Anderson - 'Reflections on Conducting Assessments for Psychotherapy ~ Back to Beginnings'

On 6th October over fifty members and associates of WMIP came together to hear a paper authored and presented by WMIP member Judith Anderson. Judith's paper thoughtfully explored key questions to ask ourselves during the assessment process, including identifying potential vulnerabilities in our clients, recognizing when therapy may not be appropriate, and understanding when external collaboration (such as with psychiatrists or mental health agencies) is needed. Additionally, we'll delve into how our own strengths and weaknesses, as well as our personal and professional development, shape the way we assess and manage risk.

Participants were able to reflect on their own experiences, share insights, and develop strategies for managing risk with vulnerable patients in their private practice.
